

That Melody Sounds Familiar.

Those of you who suffered through that pre-packaged spectacular entitled "The Life and Times of Richard Milhouse Nixon," recently presented on stage in Miami Beach with a cast of thousands, were privileged to a nostalgic view of our leader circa 1948.

In every election that Mr. Nixon has participated in we are subjected to a jumble of distortion, half-truths and downright lies. Thus it was from the days of his sordid campaign against Helen Gahagan Douglas to the present.
