Dear queried the members of the Council as to whether they realized that the bill would legitimize homosexuality, blur the distinction between homosexuality and heterosexuality as an acceptable alternative life-style, compromise the ability of parents to raise their children the way they wish and require the New York City Commission on Human Rights to work toward "educating" school children and adults alike that there is nothing wrong with being homosexual and how landlords, employers and religious institutions would be virtually powerless to draw on distinctions between homosexuals and heterosexuals.

Dear said the passage of the bill would bring a true catastrophe on New York City, even though everyone concedes that the majority of New Yorkers oppose the bill. New Yorkers should not and would not forget, he said, the perfidy being perpetrated on them.
